This is because polkis are cloudy, lack clarity, have a lower color grade, and lack the faceting that attracts people to diamonds. Because the GIA does not use the 4Cs to grade polkis, they are less valuable than ordinary cut diamonds.

These uncut, unpolished diamonds have no resale value; once purchased, you cannot resell them to the owner or anyone else.
